Thank You, Pumpers, For a Job Well Done

Even throughout a pandemic, you risked your health to answer the call to pump and maintain aging, overtaxed septic systems

or the past year and a little more, pumpers have done much to prove their worth as essential service providers. While millions of folks were sheltering in place at home, your technicians have pulled on their boots and jumped in the truck every day to help homeowners in need. They've done whatever is necessary to stay safe while traveling house-to-house during the worst pandemic in more than 100 years.

And while wastewater professionals may have approached many months of COVID-19 with some trepidation — both because of health risks and an uncertain economy — they've come through this unprecedented period working harder than ever, it seems. Every pumper I've talked to in the past year has remained busy, and they tell me it's because customers have pushed their septic systems to failure through overuse.

These reports from the field tell me a few things. And the trends I see should give pumpers a sense of security for the future.

First, the pandemic has confirmed what we've known all along: that a great number of decentralized wastewater systems users have ignored smart maintenance and have done so at their own peril. Years of neglect of septic tanks and drainfields set many homeowners and owners of commercial properties up for failed systems and major expenses for repairs or replacements.

And the timing couldn't have been worse. Septic system deficiencies often don't make themselves known until there is overloading, and the pandemic drove system flows over the brink in many cases. Think about it. When houses are empty all day long as parents go off to jobs and kids go off to school, aging systems and those seldom serviced have a brief chance to rest and recuperate. No more. Daily flushes double, tanks with little head room fill to the brim, and maintenance issues like broken baffles, corroded concrete and a lack of outlet filters rear their ugly heads.

A NEW DYNAMIC

I also realize now that the work world has been forever changed by the pandemic. A lot of employers have seen the benefits of remote workers and invited — or required — their employees to set up shop permanently at home. This will make our message of maintenance even more critical. Think about the many 1970s and '80s subdivisions in your service territory.

Now ask yourself the question: How many of these homes are still using their original septic system? I can guess what the answer is: most of them.

Will we have to change our standard answer to the ever-present question, "How often should I pump my tank?" It remains to be seen, but perhaps you will look at each customer's situation moving forward and recommend more frequent service based on the number of people at home all day and the age of the system.

Speaking of the age of septic systems, I believe the percentage of systems well beyond their expected useful service life is very large. Think about the many 1970s and '80s subdivisions in your service territory. Now ask yourself the question: How many of these homes are still using their original septic system? I can guess what the answer is: most of them. Heck, I've heard stories of homeowners who haven't cracked open their tanks for 30 years under the misguided impression that pumping is unnecessary. If they haven't pumped them, they haven't replaced them, either.

Recently I've seen social media posts from pumpers with photos of themselves standing on top of rock-solid tanks packed with sludge right up to the hard scum layer, leaving no room for inflowing wastewater and settling to occur. My fear is this is not such an unusual scene. The clock is ticking on millions of systems and we need to get out there with the message that periodic pumping is the only real way to extend the life of this antique infrastructure.



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PAY IT FORWARD

Where does this situation leave pumpers as they gear up for the busy season? Fortunately, in a better position than many small business owners in their hometowns. You have to feel bad for the restaurants, the tourist industry, and of your local neighbors whose businesses were shut down or hampered greatly by COVID-19. Many people suffered as friends and family were sickened by the virus, while others faced financial devastation during the long journey.

Those of us who have pulled through this disaster in a positive way have a lot to be thankful for. And a responsibility to keep helping in troubled times. If you are able, share your good fortune with your community. Support charitable or civic efforts to help folks as they recover from both their physical and financial injuries. Also, consider what you can do to reward your hardworking crew members who met every challenge placed in front of them in the past year. They deserve recognition for personal sacrifice and a job well done.

You also have a critical message to share with customers. It's past time they take proper care of their septic systems or face the consequences. At every opportunity, take the time to reinforce the message that periodic pumping has to be part of their homeowner or commercial business equation. A visit from a pumper or maintainer now could save them a lot of money down the road. And maintenance can prevent environmental disasters. We all want to keep our backyards and our neighbors safe from exposure to sewage.

We'll continue to preach this important message. And we'll also continue to feature the hardworking professionals that serve the wastewater industry, both in good times and bad. As we pull out of this medical nightmare and hopefully return to some sort of normalcy, I want to thank you for your service to a grateful public and wish you health and happiness.



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septic companies are three-legged stools

There are different mentalities and skill sets needed to build a successful business. To achieve success, every business — no matter the industry — must be equally balanced in three areas: technical savvy, business management and aggressive entrepreneurship.

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STOPPING THE STENCH

solutions for septic odors indoors

Occasionally, property owners complain about odors from their onsite sewage treatment system. Multiple plumbing issues can result in septic odors in buildings, but the fix is usually straightforward. This article explores several locations within an onsite system where odor can be an issue.

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hen 19-year-old Terry Kiel was presented with two job offers on the same day in 1976 — a foundry and a concrete plant — he never imagined his decision would lead to a career in the septic service industry. His brother encouraged him to learn a trade so he took the concrete job thinking he'd become a mason or block layer, but when he got there he discovered the job would be building, delivering and pumping septic tanks. It was a good company to work for so he stayed, but with no room for advancement he struck out on his own in 1987. "I built a septic truck and said. 'Here I come, world."

A year later he added sewer and drain cleaning work and the company became West Michigan Septic Sewer & Drain Service. That's when his friend Dave Snyder joined, first as a silent partner to help with financing, but soon as a full partner, stepping away from his vending machine job.

And in an amazing stroke of luck, when Kiel went to the unemployment office to hire a laborer to help with the sewer and drain work, he found someone from that industry who could teach him the trade and advise him on equipment. In the early 1990s he bought a backhoe and a dump truck and added repairs and installations.

Kiel and Snyder learned many lessons over the years. A couple of them were real game changers: 1. Being busy is not the same as being profitable. And 2. Despite concrete being the world Kiel grew up in and loved, he ultimately determined plastic tanks were better for his company.

Today, three names appear on the company's building, vehicles and printed material. They made a couple acquisitions over the years — City Sewer & Drain Service and Heckman's Contracting — and kept the names for legal and name recognition purposes. The combined company operates out of a 5,000-square-foot building on two acres of land in Muskegon, Michigan, a town of 37,000 on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan.

Snyder runs the office, doing scheduling, dispatching, invoicing and talking to customers, while Kiel is usually found on an excavation project along with Ron Williams and Travis Barrett. Kiel's son Jacob and stepson T.J. Stariha do sewer and drain work, and 27-year company veteran Jon Stephens handles pumping. Joe Magner and Ryan George fill in where needed.

Kiel says it's tough finding people, but they pay well and provide medical insurance, an IRA plan, paid vacations, short-term disability insurance, uniforms with weekly laundering and work shoes.

LOOKING GOOD

Kiel learned the importance of presenting a good image from his former employer. He built his first septic truck using a semi-tractor with a stretched frame not only because it could carry a 3,000-gallon tank (Presvac) and he thought it would last a long time, but because of its appearance. "It was a 'pretty' septic truck, if that makes sense," he says. "I learned that from my employer — you've got to know what you're doing and all that, but if you can look good, you're in."

When a banker advised him to write a business plan, he hired an expert to make sure it looked perfect. The banker was impressed and Kiel got his loan. He also chose to use an answering service rather than an answering machine, believing it appeared more professional and would prevent prospective customers from hanging up and calling someone else.

For marketing, he created a flyer with a lot of graphics, "So, no matter how you threw it away, the logo or the truck or my picture was going to show." When the company started expanding the service territory, they obtained local phone numbers to make it easy for people to contact them. They maintain seven numbers.

The company carries 300 feet of hose on the vacuum truck so it can be parked on the road rather than on a customer's property, avoiding the possibility of cracking a driveway or causing damage. It also gives them visibility, Kiel says, and is a subtle message to neighbors (potential customers) that you won't destroy their yard.

All printed material has the company motto, "Honesty is still our policy," because Kiel wants people to know it's always been their policy. Sometimes it hurts to be honest, he says, but you've got to do it. Looking good also refers to professional conduct.

"You pull in with clean equipment and uniforms and you try your best to leave everything like you found it," he says. "We have a soil conditioner on our skid-steer that grinds up the topsoil. We skim that off, pile it in a corner, put the septic system in, then put that topsoil back on. People are happy. It levels their yard off and it looks better than when we got there."

BREAKING AWAY FROM CONCRETE

Until a few years ago, Kiel purchased concrete tanks from his former employer. It took a lot of persuasion to convince him to switch to plastic, but a salesman finally talked him into trying an Infiltrator Water Technologies unit with an EZflow drainfield.

"He gave me a free one and we gave it to a customer, just charging for the labor," he says. "I gave a 12-year warranty and the manufacturer said he'd stand behind it." Kiel was quickly sold.

"The technology has come so far that it's now a better product," he admits. "The tank is watertight, the drainfield is cleaner. You learn that stone is not drainage, it's storage until the water can drain into the soil. The EZFlow is clean and neat. And it's made of recycled products."

Another advantage was the light weight of the tanks, enabling the company to sell their large excavation equipment. "We got rid of all that big heavy iron," Kiel says. "We can set these tanks with a mini excavator." Current equipment includes a Takeuchi TB235 compact excavator, Case 590 and John Deere 310 backhoes, Takeuchi skid-steer and a 12-yard 2005 Mack dump truck.

Kiel says stone and pipe is cheaper but takes more time and labor to install so cost-wise it's about the same. The company provides a 12-year warranty on new units with the stipulation it's the one to maintain it.

The company now uses Infiltrator and EZflow on all new installations. But concrete tanks still make up the bulk of their pumping and repair work. For risers on those tanks they use 18-inch culverts and cut them to length. And Kiel has his former employer make adapter rings for the older tanks with square covers. The company prefers to bury risers three inches below the surface for safety reasons. Waste is hauled to the Muskegon municipal plant, which Kiel says is one of the best in the world.

When the boss is laid up

In the winter of 2019, Terry Kiel slipped on the ice on the job. "I caught myself," he says, "but I hit my elbow and jammed my shoulder and tore the rotator cuff." He's only a few years from retirement but knew it was serious enough he couldn't wait. "I hated to take off work to do it, but I had to get it fixed or it wasn't going to get better."

Kiel was out of commission for a number of weeks before getting the go-ahead to operate heavy equipment again. But it didn't take him long to head out to a job site. "I wanted to see what they were doing," he says. "I pointed my finger at things and told them what I thought." He was on the phone with the team fairly often. And with cellphones the guys were able to send him photos if they needed him to look at something.

Fortunately the accident happened during the winter, a slower time for the company, but nevertheless work continued and the team at West Michigan Septic Sewer & Drain Service really stepped up and figured out how to do things on their own.

"The guys could handle it," Kiel says. "And that's good because they got a chance to do some of that stuff."

"People come from all over to check it out," he says. "They've got hundreds of acres and made a system that is huge. And they take anything — grease, septic waste, light chemicals. Not many municipalities have that."

REPAIR OR REPLACE

For sewer and drain cleaning work the company uses six Ford halfton and three-quarter-ton Econolines, General Pipe Cleaners (a division of General Wire Spring) jetters in sizes up to six inches including a trailer-mounted unit, and pipe bursting equipment from HammerHead Trenchless Equipment. They have RIDGID cameras and locators and a Mighty Probe from T&T Tools.

On the pumping side, they have two vacuum trucks built by Marsh Industrial — a 1994 Kenworth tandem with a 2,500-gallon steel tank and a 1985 Mack tri-axle with a 3,300-gallon steel tank, both with National Vacuum Equipment pumps. They're old, Kiel admits, but well maintained. Engines, transmissions and tanks are changed out on pumping and excavation equipment as needed.

"We've done everything to them," Kiel says. "They make better stuff now, I'm not denying that. And they might get a little better mileage. But they're more expensive to repair because it's all high-technology stuff. So it costs you more to buy, more to repair, and it doesn't make you any more money. You either have repair bills or you have truck payments. Which do you want?"

BUT ARE YOU MAKING MONEY

As he was flipping through *Pumper* one day in the early 1990s, Kiel saw something that really struck him.

"I read this article by Frank Blau," he says. "What caught my eye was his question, 'Are you a businessman or a business technician? You're really good at your job, you just don't know if you made any money or not." He contacted Blau who ran him through some numbers.

"He asked me how much I charged to clean a tank, and I told him. Then he asked me how much it cost me to clean a tank, and I said I don't really know. 'Then how do you know if you're making any money?' he asked. He told me everything I didn't want to hear, but needed to hear."

Thus began his business education. And even though Kiel and Snyder were living paycheck to paycheck at the time, they splurged and bought \$350 worth of videotapes to learn everything they could about the business end of running a company.

Instead of basing their rates on what everybody else was charging, they learned to set prices so all expenses were covered, including nonproductive overhead, which is everything needed to run a business that doesn't directly produce income. Blau also taught them to realize their value to society. "He said doctors, lawyers and dentists are prestigious jobs and everybody looks up to them, but when your septic tank doesn't work you're as important as they are."

LOOSE ENDS

Kiel and Snyder are both 63 and starting to think about retirement. But before they step away there are a few things they need to take care of. First and foremost is getting the company onto better technology for managing projects, employees, customers, vehicles and equipment. Their current homegrown system is outdated and inadequate. Kiel says they may have a custom system built.

Looking back, Kiel says the partnership with Snyder has been great despite, or maybe because, they have a different outlook on things. But next on the agenda is succession planning. Kiel's sons are interested in taking over the business but no definitive plans have been made. "We're not there yet," he says. "We still have some time. You get so busy doing stuff, but that's our next job."

Kiel's accidental drift into septic work turned out to be a good thing, he says. "You just grow to love it. You're on your own. You're making something out of nothing. It's the American dream — to own your own company."



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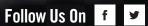

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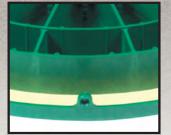

Pridgeport, California, is a tiny tourist town in the Eastern Sierra. During late spring to early fall, vacationers flock to small hotels, inns and about a dozen surrounding campgrounds to experience world-class fishing. Bridgeport Vacation Trailer Rentals rents, sets up and services 40 recreational vehicles in those campgrounds.

Owned since 1962 by Mike and Gretchen Montgomery, the business is now run by their granddaughter, Daniella Talamantes, and her wife, Angel Talamantes. Daniella grew up in the company. Now 30, she knows every facet of the business, which stays open late spring until just before the first snow. The majority of campgrounds where their rentals are positioned are U.S. Forest Service-owned, about 13 miles up a relatively steep mountain road.

In 1990, Mike Montgomery realized that from both an efficiency and cost perspective, it made sense to pump out their own rental units' "black tanks," RV terminology for wastewater holding tanks. He bought the company's first pumping rig, and they've been servicing their own trailers ever since, as well as those of other campers who approach them when they see the slogan on their tanks: "Flag us down — we take crap off everybody!"

One pumping call is included for each rental week, along with potable water refill, since most of the campsites don't feature utility hook-ups. Bridgeport promotes business primarily with a website (www. bvtrentals.com), a rack card, business cards and campground envelopes (described later).

BVTR now runs two 14-foot flatbed trailers on double Dexter axles, both fitted with a standard square hitch that fits the receiver used to haul rentals. "Everything we use has to do double duty" to stay lean and cost-effective, says Daniella.

THE RIGHT EQUIPMENT

Mounted on each trailer is a Phelps Honey Wagon 300G pump running on a 5.5 Honda GX 160 gas engine. It will pump 50-60 gpm on a lift up to 25 feet, though they don't do any inground pumping. Contents pump through 60 feet of 3-inch hose, connected via rubber adapter to a 4-inch RhinoFLEX (Camco Mfg.) RV waste hose. This ends in a Valterra 5-inch ClearView extension, and closes with a RhinoFlex sewer cap. It empties into a 525-gallon poly tank. The business has a dump station connected to the municipal sewer at its yard.

"The trailer unit is the best setup for us," Daniella explains, "because we don't have to pay for licensing, insurance and registration for a dedicated truck that we may not otherwise use. When we're done pumping, we

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can unhitch the trailer and use the trucks to haul rentals, pick up supplies or anything else."

The women agree that a dual-axle trailer unit is much more maneuverable among the many trees and other trailers inside the campgrounds, where it must be positioned toward the rear of the unit to be pumped, where drainpipes are located. Two axles also make jackknifing far less likely.

The economics work for them. Daniella estimates that a business wanting to add RV pumping as a sideline could set up such a unit for under \$10,000. "The trailer is roughly \$2,000. The pump itself is \$3,000. The tank is about a thousand dollars, and I think that came with the hose. Then add your insurance and everything."

SERVICE LOGISTICS

Angel describes a typical pumping run, which they do in separate rigs on Tuesdays and Thursdays:

"Normally, each campground has a two-lane road. There are some tight spots, but it's important to make sure we're able to run the liquid downhill, to get the pump to prime. So you've got to strategically place yourself where the hose is going to be a straight shot. You don't want to have to drag it around a bunch of branches and stuff.

"You also don't want to mess up someone's campsite, and you can't park where no one will be able to get around you. But it's almost inevitable with that. I put my flashers on, and I won't be too long, but you get the occasional impatient camper."

Daniella agrees. "You're not able to please everybody. If we're in the roadway, we're doing our job and we're not going to be there more than 10 minutes. If you can't wait, just reverse and find another way to get past."

One thing most non-RVers don't know is that the level sensors inside RV black and gray (used water) tanks are notoriously inaccurate, due to the inevitable buildup of gunk and scum. Often, the women will complete a pumpout, then get a call from the renter saying their gauges show the tank still full. They explain the sensor issue, which some folks don't believe, because they can still see a small level of liquid left in the tank. As pumpers know, this will always be the case, even right after pumping.

So they show their customers that "we always use a clear hose connector," Angel says. "We can see what's going on in the hose. When everything's done coming out, it's empty."

THE URBAN LEGEND

They provide rolling 10-gallon "blue boy" tanks, into which renters can partially empty a graywater tank until they can get a pumpout. Instructions left with the rental forbid using these for sewage. Once filled, they can wheel it to a campground dumpsite.

When they pump out a trailer, they put a bucket or basin below the drain connection to catch stray drips. They painstakingly avoid large spills, which could become a hazmat situation and potential legal liability. For this reason, they remove the black tank valve handle, to discourage people from accidentally opening it. To pump, they open the valve with a hammer

claw. They carry extra buckets, spill towels, extra hoses, bottles of bleach and a large quantity of disposable gloves, worn for every pumpout.

Asked about the urban legend about a trailer pumpout resulting in a collapsed black or gray tank, they laugh and say many ask about that. "We've never had it happen or heard of it actually happening," says Daniella. "But if it did, it was likely the result of someone using way too high a vacuum on a unit whose vent stack was clogged. It is theoretically possible, but really unlikely."

Most malfunctions are a result of user abuse. Bridgeport supplies single-ply, rapid-dissolving toilet paper and forbids use of anything else in their rentals. "Double-ply doesn't dissolve fast enough during the time that average campers use a rig, so it builds up in the tanks and clogs," explains Daniella. "We don't allow flushable wipes or anything else," she says, admitting that nevertheless, they frequently must deal with clogs caused by everything from pinecones to sunglasses and baseball caps, somehow going into the toilets. This usually entails fishing an old broom handle up through a hose or down into the tank.

Angel adds, "We use an additive that helps break down waste and toilet paper, which also lubricates the valves to keep them opening and closing easily. And it definitely helps with the smell."

She likes to lay her hoses out in long, parallel loops on the trailer between pumpouts. "It's more efficient when I go to the next rig. I just pull it out — there are no snarls, knots or kinks in it."

In campgrounds that don't offer their own pumping service, Bridgeport hands out bright yellow-orange envelopes with instructions printed on them. Campers who wish to get pumped out leave cash in the envelope, and tack it to the numbered site post. They don't need to be present for service.

SAFETY FIRST

All services are performed with constant vigilance for people and pets roaming close by. "We haven't really hit anything," Angel says. "I think people see what we're doing, and they don't want to get too close."

Daniella agrees, saying that being hyper-careful becomes a state of mind when servicing campgrounds. "We've basically been doing this since we could drive, so you just get good at it."

Manage Your Digital Twin So You Don't Turn Off Customers

Follow these 7 steps to make sure people see you and your septic service company in a positive light and keep calling

hy would I hire a contractor who chooses a middle finger shot as his Twitter profile picture? Goodness knows I made some bad choices of my own, but clearly, he's not ready to work for us."

A little digging on the internet can reveal a wealth of information. Some of it's true, some of it isn't, and all of it is out there for the world to see. Fair? Probably not, but it is what it is. Our digital doppelgangers have tremendous power, and as long as finding information online is easy, it will be found.

So, what's a small business owner to do to gain control of his or her online image without spending a fortune? By following seven simple steps, you can take charge of your digital reputation.

Step One: Understand Your Digital DNA

The first step in managing the cyber you is understanding who creates him or her. If you use social media, you're contributing to your footprint. If you have ever owned property, had a land line, donated to charity, sat on a board, or participated in any activity where information is published in an online newsletter, that information is part of the digital you.

You need to understand your digital twin has lots of parents, and some of them are more concerned about presenting him or her in a positive light than others. Google yourself, and make a list of where information is surfacing.

Step Two: Choose a Strategy

The key to an effective online presence (or absence) is planning. Without a strategy, you have no plan. To manage the online you, you must decide what you want people to find. You might choose to present yourself as an expert in the wastewater industry, the owner of a great company to work for, or professional, career-minded individual. Whatever the choice, have a goal for presenting an online picture that matches your offline objectives.

Step Three: Remember, It's Not All Bad

In most cases, a well-managed digital presence is better than no presence at all. Think about it; if you were in a hiring manager's chair and could find nothing in cyberspace about a candidate you were considering for an important job, would it concern you? Maybe.

The online you should be your advocate, not your adversary, and if you don't manage him or her, you roll the dice and take your chances.

What most likely wouldn't concern you, however, would be the discovery of a professional LinkedIn page. In fact, the existence of such a page would probably serve as additional evidence of the candidate's qualifications and suitability for a job.

Step Four: Put the Best You Out There

A picture is worth a thousand words, and a lot of what people say about themselves when choosing a profile photo isn't too good. The photos are blurry, old or just inappropriate. Get a professional photo taken and use it.

Your virtual you should be congruent with the real you. In other words, don't promise one thing and deliver something else. Update your photo every five years or after you've had any significant physical transformation.

Next, check your privacy settings on all social sites into which you opt in. Do you really want people knowing what you've "liked" online, what you're following, and so forth? If your brand strategy isn't to be political or provoking, think before you comment on anything controversial.

Also, don't forget that privacy settings change, people share comments, and so forth. In short, what you say among friends may at some point be seen by people you wouldn't expect to have access to your conversations.

When it comes to social media, be disciplined and make choices that fit with your strategy.

Step Five: Manage Unflattering Information

If you've got information out in cyberspace you wish weren't there, and you are blessed with a common name, your dark data is probably buried pretty far down in the search results — especially if you actively publish other information about yourself.

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If you have a rather unusual name coupled with a bad PR problem, you'll need to be more proactive. Make site-by-site requests for information removal and start publishing. Comment on reputable blogs using your real name, leave product reviews also using your real name, publish articles and so forth. Your goal is to create noise and push negative information to the bottom of the pile. The stronger the sites where you post "good" data, the more likely those items will appear at the top of the results.

For most people, a do-it-yourself approach is sufficient, but if you've tried and are still struggling, you can always hire an expert. Prices vary widely, so shop around.

Step Six: Set Up an Auditing System

Online reputation management isn't a one-and-done activity. It's ongoing because the internet is fluid. What's there today could be gone tomorrow and vice versa.

As your own reputation manager, this means you must be on your toes and aware of what's being said about you. An easy way to stay in the know is to set up a Google alert for your name. Then, as that search engine finds new mentions of you, it will let you know.

Next, search the top engines for your name once a month. Check the first two pages of results for anything troubling. Finally, once a year, do a deep dive and look at every result. It's time consuming but worth the effort — especially if you've encountered problems in the past.

Step Seven: Remember Why You Care

When you work hard to make the real you great, your digital twin shouldn't be allowed to ruin your reputation. In other words, the online you should be your advocate, not your adversary, and if you don't manage him or her, you roll the dice and take your chances.





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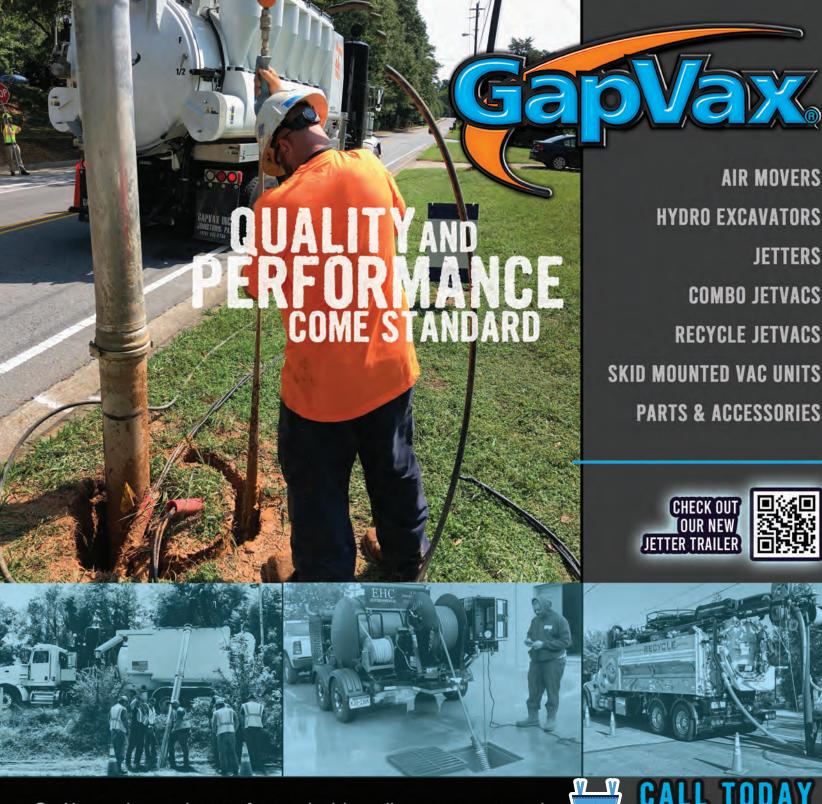
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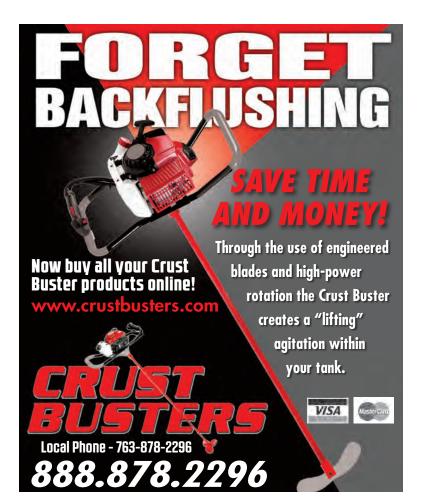

Indiana Bill Could Protect Users of Functioning Onsite Systems From Mandated Sewer Conversion

bill in the Indiana Legislature would alter the cost of replacing onsite systems with municipal services by changing the state's financial rules.

The particular focus of HB 1287 is developed and underserved communities with failing septic systems. Under the bill as it stands, a utility would have to show that the money paid by at least half of the potential customers in a proposed expansion would be enough to repay the expansion cost within 20 years. If there would not be enough money to repay the cost, the utility could require a deposit or other assurance from potential customers, or from the developer or an economic development organization.

An underserved area, the bill says, is developed land where structures receive water mainly from private wells or dispose of wastewater through private onsite systems.

The bill also addresses a common complaint: property owners forced to connect to municipal sewer and water utilities even though their onsite systems are functioning. Under HB 1287, if an owner makes a property improvement that does not include a bedroom or the equivalent of a bedroom, the owner will not be required to increase the size of an absorption field or connect to municipal water and sewer, provided a written report from a qualified inspector says the onsite system is not failing.

SB 1287 was approved by the House and sent to the Senate.

A related bill in the Legislature, SB 348, would establish a task force to look at the state's wastewater infrastructure investment and service to underserved areas. The task force would not have to include a representative of the onsite industry.

Under the current version of the bill, the task force would consist of 14 people: four senators, four representatives, and six people appointed by the governor including one officer or employee of the state, one representative of wastewater management systems, one engineer or professional with expertise in wastewater management systems, one person representing ratepayers, one person representing municipalities served by a wastewater

operator not under the jurisdiction of the state utility commission, and one member of the public.

SB 348 was approved by the Senate and sent to the House.

California

Instead of being governed by regional wastewater processing rules, California wineries will now be subject to statewide rules.

The new framework of regulation, advocated by wine industry leaders, was approved by the state Water Resources Control Board. The board's order sets guidelines for wastewater processing at most of the more than 3,600 bonded wineries in the state, reported the *Press Democrat* in Santa Rosa, California.

At least 1,500 of those wineries will be inside a regulatory structure for the first time. The order increases reporting requirements, caps the volumes of water discharged through land application and subsurface disposal, and requires groundwater monitoring for the largest wineries.

There will be a three-year window for permitting and another five years for wineries to come into compliance.

Arkansas

For the first time, the state's Natural Resources Commission approved more than \$2.5 million in interest-free loans to help people in northwest Arkansas replace or repair failing onsite systems.

Loans, and some grants, will be available in the Illinois River and White River watersheds. This includes the counties of Benton, Washington, Crawford, Madison, Carroll, Boone, Newton and Franklin.

The Northwest Arkansas Democrat Gazette quoted installer Jon Jouvenaux of BBB Septic in Bentonville, Arkansas, as saying the money will serve a need after a year of pandemic. "It's not like I need any more business. We're installing systems every day," Jouvenaux said. "But people who had really nice jobs have been out of work."

And he said that because people are at home almost all the time, some onsite systems are stressed by the waste flows.

New York

The East Hampton Village Board said earlier this year that it intends to change its onsite ordinance, so more people install nitrogen-removing onsite systems. In February 2019, the board passed a law requiring advanced treatment for all new homes and for any work that expands existing homes by at least 25% or adds to the number of bedrooms, reported *The East Hampton Star.*

Under the village's expected change, advanced treatment would be required when a conventional system fails, when a property is transferred, or when a business asks for a site plan review of proposed construction.

The village is on the eastern end of Long Island where Suffolk County and other municipalities have passed onsite laws to help control pollution of Atlantic Ocean coastal waters.

Oregon

The town of Lakeview was scheduled to vote on raising its septage dumping fee from 3 cents per gallon to 6 cents. Public Works Director Jeff Marshall told the town council that neighboring communities charge 10 cents per gallon or more, reported the *Lake County Examiner*. The increase was necessary because the state Department of Environmental Quality required construction of a new \$125,000 dumping facility.

New York

About \$72,500 is still available to help people repair or replace onsite systems around Moon Lake, Red Lake and the Indian River. All are in Jefferson County, which touches northeast Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River.

In 2018, the county received \$75,000 to help people repair or replace cesspools or onsite systems that could contaminate bodies of water. Only one \$2,500 grant has been drawn from the fund, reported the *Watertown Daily Times*. About 50 homes are eligible for grants.

Wyoming

The Park County Planning and Zoning Department earlier this year approved onsite regulations that replace rules updated in 2017.

The regulations set new design and construction standards that conform to state requirements. There will also be minimum requirements for standard and nonstandard wastewater systems, reported the *Cody Enterprise*. All nonstandard systems will require an application that must be submitted before construction begins.

In addition, the regulations include limits on the use of portable restrooms. Use of chemical or portable restrooms will not be allowed for more than 30 consecutive days.

Joy Hill, the county's planning and zoning director, said the use of portable restrooms has been increasing, and she expects that use to continue increasing as there is growth in home construction and short-term rentals. She said some people make portable restrooms a nuisance by living in an RV on their property while renting out their house for the summer.

Portable toilet use is exempt from the 30-day limit at road, utility or pipeline construction sites; for seasonal agricultural use; at seasonal government inspection sites; and at remote industrial sites.

Minnesota

Otter Tail County has received \$1 million from the state to provide zero-interest loans for the replacement of failing onsite systems. According

to a guidance sheet published by the county, \$500,000 will be available for systems that serve single-family homes, and \$500,000 will be available for commercial systems.

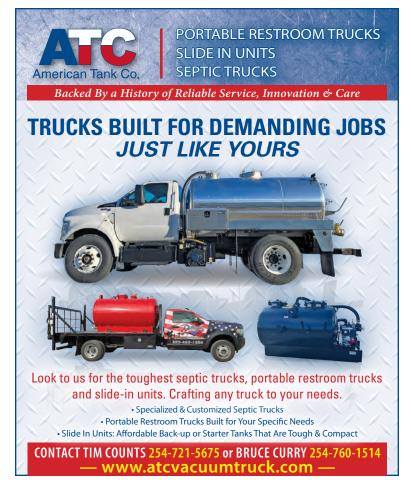
A separate pot of money from the state's Clean Water Fund will give grants to low-income households to replace failing onsite systems. Grants will cover 50% of the cost up to \$5,000. Grants will be awarded to both the property owner and the licensed installer when a project is complete.

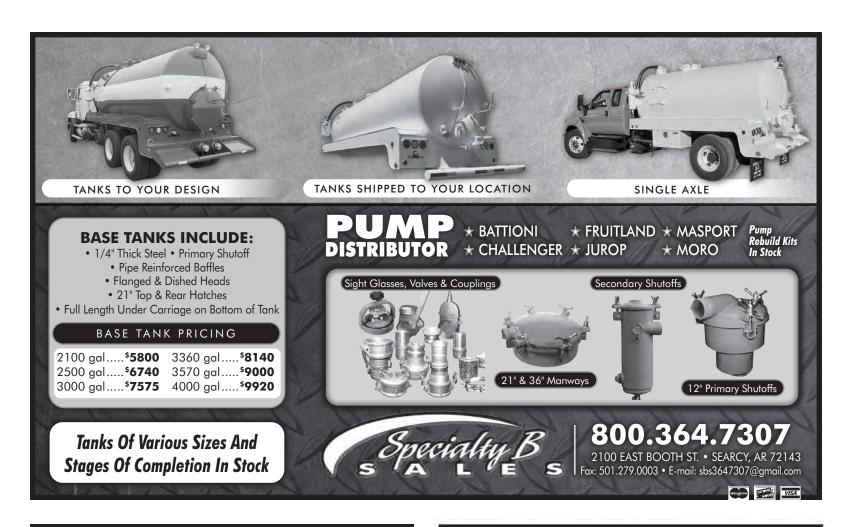
Also in Minnesota, the Mower County Board of Commissioners entered the final phase of updating its onsite ordinance earlier in the year. One major part of the proposed ordinance changes is a requirement that an onsite system be updated before ownership is transferred or escrow is in place, reported the *Austin Daily Herald*, of Austin, Minnesota.

"One of the challenges in current property transfers is that sometimes sellers are leaving the state and going to other locations," Angela Lipelt, the county's environmental services supervisor, told the newspaper. "They didn't know they had to do anything, and it's difficult to find them."

The proposed changes also include constant compliance for commercial systems through either inspections or permits. ${f P}$

It's Time to Vent About Hydrogen Sulfide Corrosion

Onsite experts and tank manufacturers continue to seek solutions for concrete deterioration. Sulfate-resistant formulas and secondary venting can have an impact.

t has been three or four years since I've had a specific question about septic system venting and the impact it has on reduction of gas concentrations at septic tank outlets. Every service provider has seen corrosion in concrete tanks. Most commonly, excessive deterioration is taking place around the outlet baffle in a septic tank. The question is whether anything can be done to stop it. The reader in this case was seeing problems in an aerobic system in the pump tank.

When I started in the industry, it was recognized that the sewer line, septic tank and, by extension, the drainfield vented back to the indoor plumbing and through the roof vent. Most systems being evaluated at the time ran septic tank to distribution box to drainfield. As we are aware, there are often a number of additional pieces in our systems that make venting all parts back through the roof vent problematic, resulting in the need for additional venting.



We won't go into tremendous detail because a lot has been written about the causes and stages of concrete corrosion. Interior concrete walls are also attacked when sulfuric acid forms in the airspace above the waterline. The hydrogen sulfide gas is at first dissolved in the sewage, but then exsolves out into the airspace when it reaches a certain concentration. In the presence of oxygen from incoming water or airspace in the septic tank or pump tank, exsolved hydrogen sulfide gas is converted to sulfuric acid, or H2SO4.

WATCH FOR CROWN ROT

When hydrogen sulfide gas comes out of solution from sewage, it collects at the lowest point because it is heavier than air. The corrosion is most often noticed first in the area of the outlet baffle where the gases will collect. Note, however, corrosion will also occur above the waterline in the tank and on the bottom of the lid. In this moist environment reacting with water and microbes, the sulfuric acid in combination with microbes begins to attack the concrete.

The corrosive action reduces the structural strength and durability of the concrete. It also increases the permeability of the concrete itself, which further leads to cracking and a condition called "crown rot." This can cause concrete baffles, the lid and the tank itself to slough and crumble. Since bacteria and other microbes are essential for the process to occur, the entire process is called microbiologically induced corrosion.

Since I am a soil scientist by training, I recognize that in areas where the soils are high in sulfates, the corresponding groundwater also has more sulfates, and problems with concrete corrosion are more prevalent. So at least in some areas, soils and water quality have a role to play in terms of the severity of the problem.

Now to the question of what can be done. As with most of the problems we see, there is no single solution that will take care of all of the issues. This is due to the wide diversity of systems and each one is unique in some respect.

For a long time, I said either inadequate ventilation of the septic tank or use of a poor concrete mix during manufacture made the tank and

baffles more susceptible to corrosion. The solution was either investigate and make sure the tank vented back through the roof vent, or replace the tank with one that used a sulfate-resistant mix. While these are still options, both the occurrence and solution are more complex.

turbulence within the tank. This reduces the opportunity for effluent to mix with oxygen in the tank, resulting in the formation of the gases and sulfuric acid as described. This may also be helpful in other aerobic tank situations.

DIFFERENTIAL VENTING

The National Precast Concrete Association has standards for tank manufacture including sulfateresistant mixes and has continued to do research on the efficacy of different adhesive coatings that can be applied above the waterline and other areas susceptible to corrosion. In areas such as I mentioned above with groundwater high in sulfates, these should be used at a minimum. The NPCA continues its efforts to find solutions to this issue.

Service providers have also observed the problem does not seem to be only from within the septic or other sewage tank, but from components downstream in the system such as the drainfield. This was evidenced by corrosion directly above the outlet baffle in the tank and in distribution or drop boxes serving the soil treatment area.

Within the last 4-5 years there has been some research on whether adding additional or differential venting to a system helps improve air flow through parts or all of the system. The answer is yes. Adding additional vents and constructing each part of the system from septic tank, pump tank, distribution boxes and either above- or inground soil treatment areas with venting in mind can improve the situation. There are two rules to differential venting: The additional vent needs to be at a lower level than the roof vent and slightly above the elevation of the soil treatment area.

Additional vents may improve air flow, but it does not mean simply adding them will solve the problem. Since they need to work in tandem with the roof vent, the same issues that plague venting sewage odors will interfere with the supplemental venting. These include back drafts due to topography, roof steepness, winds and tall trees altering air flow around the system. Unfortunately, as indicated earlier, it makes working on each system a mystery to be solved on its own with a unique set of circumstances.

One last comment for now: Some modifications in pump tanks have helped in some situations. Since pump tanks are receiving effluent from the septic tank, directing flow at the inlet to near the bottom of the tank and placing the weep hole in the outlet pipe where it will be under water most of the time can cut down on

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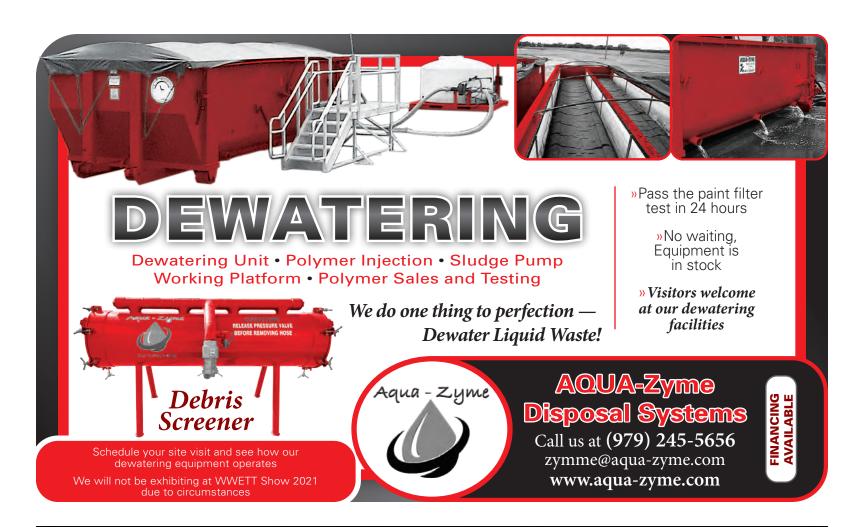
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Common Sense Is a Rare and Valuable Commodity in Wastewater Regulations

British Columbia onsite rules should consider unique site conditions to come up with practical and sometimes lower-cost treatment solutions, says Joe Karthein

In States Snapshot, we talk to a member of a state, provincial or national trade association in the decentralized wastewater industry. This time we visit a member of WCOWMA Onsite Wastewater Management of British Columbia (WCOWMA-BC).

Name and title or job description: Joe Karthein, owner

Services we offer: We are primarily focused on installation but will occasionally do septic system design.

Age: 46

Years in the industry: 6

Association involvement: I am a member of WCOWMA Onsite Wastewater Management of B.C. (WCOWMA-BC).

Benefits of belonging to the association: WCOWMA advocates on behalf of wastewater industry professionals in British Columbia. It is crucial for wastewater professionals to know someone has their back. I always learn so much at their annual trade show and am grateful for this always well-run event.

Biggest issue facing your association right now: Interior Health, the provincial government's health protection branch, puts 100% of accountability on septic system planners/designers, whether they are engineers or registered onsite wastewater practitioners (ROWPs) like myself. The consequence has been little to no oversight from Interior Health or anyone else. There are few, if any, employees at Interior Health who really know our 367-page Sewerage System Standard Practices Manual (SPM) and that leads to inadequate checks and balances for dealing with rogue engineers and ROWPs who are not following SPM standards and/or doing shoddy work, which could create health hazards. If an engineer's work is in question, the only recourse is to go to the engineers' professional organization, Engineers and Geoscientists British Columbia (EGBC) — a classic example of putting the fox in charge of the henhouse. My experience is that case reviewers at EGBC are not familiar with the intricacies of the SPM. We need better accountability systems.

Our crew includes: For the last five years it has just been myself and the indispensable Shane Kratz. I'd like to keep it that way — a small tight ship, 100% accountability. If Shane is going to meet me at a given time and he's not there (which is very rare) I know I mixed something up.

Typical day on the job: There is no typical day for me. While I plan things carefully and take pride in honoring all my commitments, I have no problem changing gears in an instant provided it doesn't negatively impact Shane or my clients. Prioritization and communication are the keys to success in this business. I keep on top of the computer work as much as I can, whether it is invoicing, emailing clients or paying bills. I use a computer with an actual keyboard versus my phone wherever possible as the phone inevitably results in miscommunications and errors. Also, I work plenty of really long days whenever required. Up here, most of the installers only work about nine months of the year, so if I wasn't doing plenty of 12-hour (or even 15 or 16) days during the "on" season, I'd think of myself as pretty lazy.

The job I'll never forget: My first septic job, which was only six years ago. I installed four rows of Infiltrator (Water Technologies) chambers in beautiful sunny weather on an absolutely beautiful rural property. I remember so well thinking that I just love this work. The trench digging went fast and it was so rewarding to finish all those nice level trenches in a single day. Since this install, I've done well over 100 septic systems and I still love the work.

My favorite piece of equipment: It is a toss-up between my Stihl 440 chain saw and my truck and the way I've customized it. The saw is an





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older carbureted model that still runs like a champ. We do a lot of rural work so that means dealing with a lot of trees. My saw is always with me stored in my truck and I seem to use it constantly. My truck is a 2016 Ram 3500, bought new. I was able to order exactly what I wanted with all the heaviest-duty options like automatic air bag suspension. I mounted big aluminum side boxes in the truck bed that still allow me to haul gooseneck trailers but they give me two long storage compartments for everything from saws and rakes to shovels and digging bars. The beauty of the system is that it locks with my key fob via the tailgate. Also, almost every day I am standing on that checker-plate surface of the compartments and I can even load all sizes of 8-foot wide Premier Plastics septic tanks width-wise on top.

Most challenging site I've worked on: Another toss up. Was it that steep rocky scree slope of pipe-puncturing fractured rock? That job seemed endless even though it was only a tank and pump chamber install that dosed to a common dispersal field. I used something like seven dump trucks of bedding sand to bury the tanks and 200 feet of pipe. That job beat the heck out of my excavators. Or was it that nasty, high-groundwater site where digging to depth for the concrete pump chamber required my water pump running continuously for hours? When it came time to place the pump chamber on that one, the swimming pool-sized hole came close to consuming my 8-ton excavator.

Oops, I wish I could take this one back: One of my bigger mistakes was when I misinterpreted a very poorly done "septic approval for the purposes of subdivision plan." Its content made me think it was an approved and filed septic design plan that was ready for installation. When I went to install the septic tank in the exact location specified, I hit bedrock at two feet. I poked around elsewhere and there was poor quality thin soil with drainage issues throughout the property. After further exploration, I turned up the two test holes used by the engineer to grant the subdivision approval. The deeper of the two holes was only 28 inches. Here in British Columbia, these test holes need to be a minimum of 60 to 84 inches depending on soils and intended dispersal field. I bailed on the job thinking my further involvement in doing things correctly from that point on would only cause more difficulty for the property owner who I felt very badly for. The whole thing cost me many days of wasted time, a ridiculous amount of driving and I lost a week of revenue.

The craziest question I've been asked by a customer: It's more of a genre of questioning — people grinding me on price. It is crazy for the client to do this because it will result in me wanting to round up numbers on their invoice rather than my more typical rounding down in their favor.

If I could change one industry regulation, it would be: I wish our SPM had specific exclusions for large rural properties (like, say, five acres or more). For example, under our current standards, a modest home in the middle of a 20-acre property with fast-draining gravelly sand soils and a 300-foot deep water well located 500 feet from the proposed septic field would require a dosed/pumped system. Exclusion examples could be things like doubled horizontal setback distances for water wells and property lines to permit the use of simple gravity-based systems in faster draining soils. It just doesn't seem right to install a \$20,000 system here when an \$8,000 system would have no chance of creating a health hazard and it would eliminate all the complications a pump brings into the equation. This kind of stuff brings a bad name to our industry.

Best piece of small business advice I've heard: "When starting out on a new business or new aspect of your business, ask the right questions to the right people and, just as importantly, be open to their answers even if it is not what you want to hear." I used to be a small business counselor, mentoring people starting small businesses. The successful startups fast-tracked their way to having viable businesses by asking hard questions to everyone they could think of who might know something about their industry — including their competition. Most of the time, by engaging with your competition you make allies and learn from their mistakes instead of from your own.

If I wasn't working in the wastewater industry, I would: I've always thought being a park ranger would be a terrific job.

Crystal ball time – This is my outlook for the wastewater industry: I would guess the Type 3 treatment systems will get better and better — more efficient, less maintenance, and less expensive. I sure hope they do as we are cramming more and more people on this little old planet. **P**
